Description

The Arduino Bughopper is a compact USB-to-UART bridge board designed to bring straightforward remote debugging via its JCTL 2.54 mm connector. Built around the FT230XQ, the Bughopper provides a reliable, high-speed serial link between your development machine and the target board, enabling advanced debugging and logging without occupying the board's main I/O pins. Its compact 38.5 × 11 mm footprint, USB-C® connectivity, and multiple header options make it easy to integrate into any workspace, enclosure, or automated test setup.

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1 Application Examples

The Arduino Bughopper, when connected to an Arduino UNO Q board, provides a dedicated debugging and serial communication channel for various development scenarios. Below are some application examples that demonstrate its practical value:

- **Embedded development and debugging:** The Bughopper streamlines the firmware development workflow by providing a dedicated debug serial channel that does not interfere with the UNO Q's main I/O pins.
- **Remote debug over serial:** Connect the Bughopper to the target board's JCTL 2.54 mm connector to establish a dedicated UART link for real-time debugging. Developers can open the Linux console, monitor serial output, send debug commands, and inspect firmware behavior directly from their development machine via USB-C, all without occupying the UNO Q's primary serial port or I/O headers.
- **Firmware flashing and continuous UART logging:** Use the Bughopper as a persistent serial interface for firmware updates and continuous data logging during long-running tests. Its reliable USB-to-UART bridge (FT230XQ) ensures stable communication at data rates from 300 baud to 3 Mbaud, making it suitable for both routine flashing and high-throughput logging scenarios.
- **Research and development (R&D) and testing:** The Bughopper enables R&D teams and test engineers to integrate reliable debug access into their prototyping and validation workflows.
- **Field diagnostics and automated test:** Install the Bughopper into automated testing rigs to provide consistent, hands-free serial access to UNO Q boards. Its compact form factor and dual header options (2.54 mm female and 1.27 mm male) allow integration into custom test fixtures, enabling field diagnostics and continuous integration pipelines for hardware and software validation.
- **Education and training labs:** The Bughopper offers a low-cost, student-friendly tool for teaching serial communication protocols and hardware debugging fundamentals.
- **Teaching UART communication and debugging workflows:** Institutions teaching embedded systems, Internet of Things (IoT) development, or hardware debugging can use the Bughopper with UNO Q boards to provide hands-on lab exercises. Students learn serial communication protocols, debugging techniques, and project troubleshooting using a modern USB-C interface with clear power status LEDs for quick visual feedback.



2 Features

2.1 General Specifications Overview

The Arduino Bughopper is a compact USB-to-UART bridge board built around the FT230XQ from FTDI. Designed for the Arduino UNO Q, it connects via the JCTL 2.54 mm connector to provide a dedicated debug and serial communication channel that does not interfere with the board's main I/O.

The main features of the Bughopper are highlighted in the table shown below.

3.1 Recommended Operating Conditions

The table below provides a comprehensive guideline for the optimal use of the Arduino Bughopper, outlining typical operating conditions and design limits. The operating conditions of the Bughopper are largely based on the specifications of the FT230XQ USB-to-UART bridge and the board's level translator (SN74AVC2T245RSWR).

¹ V_{TARGET} is a voltage input to the Bughopper supplied by the connected target board through the JCTL 2.54 mm connector. The Bughopper uses this voltage as the reference for the level translator (target side) and the V_{TARGET} status LED. The actual V_{TARGET} value depends on the connected board.

Driver Tip: The Bughopper uses the FT230XQ from FTDI, which is supported by FTDI's royalty-free **Virtual Com Port (VCP)** and **Direct (D2XX)** drivers. These drivers are [available for Windows, macOS, and Linux](#), and enable the board to appear as a standard serial COM port on your development machine.

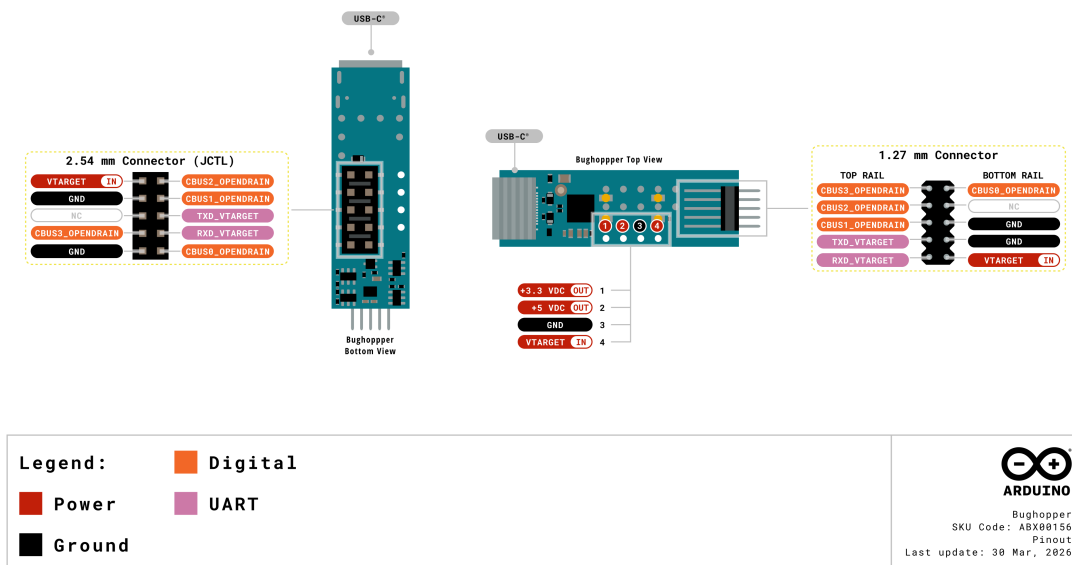
Safety Note: The Bughopper is powered exclusively through its USB-C connector. **Do not attempt to supply external power through the header connector pins.** Ensure that the JCTL 2.54 mm connector is properly aligned before connecting the Bughopper to the target board to prevent damage to both boards.

4 Functional Overview

The core of the Arduino Bughopper is the FT230XQ USB-to-UART bridge from FTDI. The board receives +5 VDC power from the USB-C connector and generates +3.3 VDC through the FT230XQ's internal voltage regulator. UART signals (TXD and RXD) are routed through a bidirectional level translator (SN74AVC2T245RSWR), which ensures safe voltage-level translation between the +3.3 VDC domain of the FT230XQ and the V_{TARGET} domain of the connected target board. V_{TARGET} is a voltage input to the Bughopper provided by the target board through the JCTL 2.54 mm connector; refer to the target board's documentation for its specific V_{TARGET} value. Four onboard LEDs provide visual status: a green LED for the +3.3 VDC power rail, a red LED for the V_{TARGET} rail, and two yellow LEDs for TXD and RXD activity.

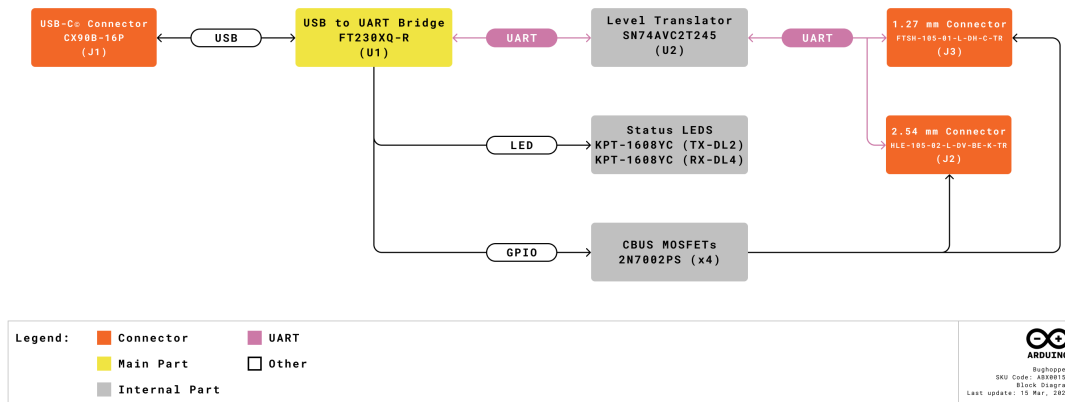
The Bughopper connectors pinout is shown in the figure below.

4.2 Block Diagram

An overview of the high-level architecture of the Arduino Bughopper is illustrated in the figure below.



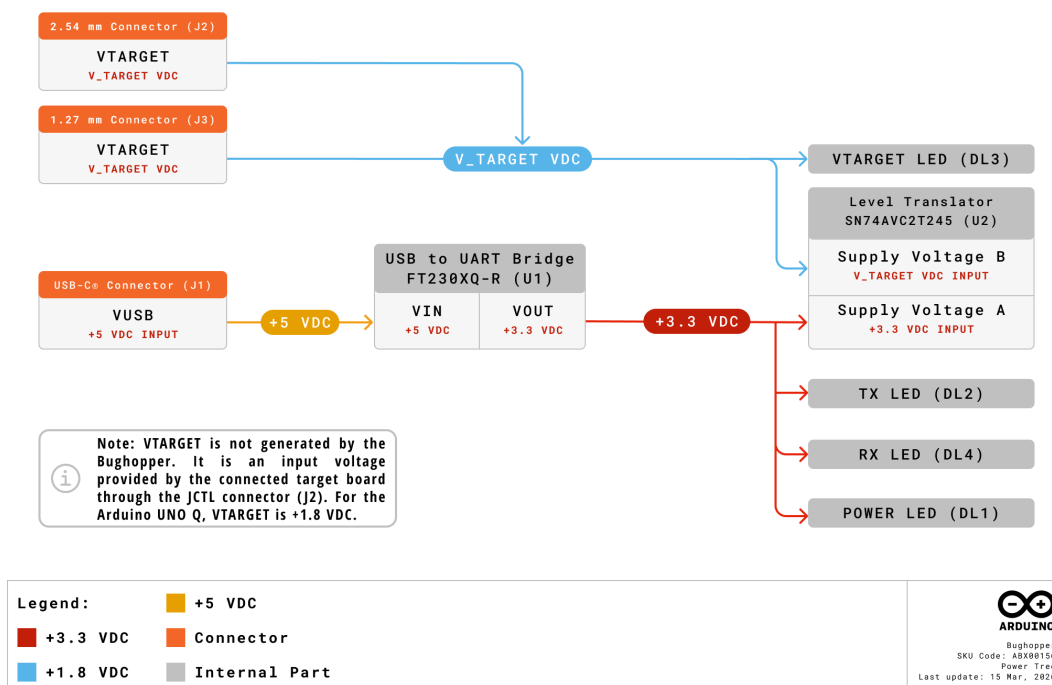
Bughopper high-level architecture block diagram.

The Bughopper's architecture can be summarized in the following functional blocks:

- **USB-C connector:** Provides the physical USB interface to the host development machine. Includes ESD protection (ESD321DYAR) on the data lines and a TVS diode (STN1010SB301) on V_{BUS} .
- **FTDI FT230XQ:** The main IC of the board. It handles the entire USB protocol, converts USB data to UART signals (TXD, RXD), generates +3.3 VDC via its internal voltage regulator, and provides four configurable GPIOs.
- **Level translator (SN74AVC2T245RSWR):** Performs bidirectional voltage-level translation between the FT230XQ's +3.3 VDC UART signals and the V_{TARGET} domain (from +1.2 to +3.6 VDC) of the connected target board, ensuring safe communication across different voltage levels. V_{TARGET} is supplied by the target board through the JCTL 2.54 mm connector.
- **Auxiliary FT230XQ's GPIO Lines (x4, via 2N7002PS MOSFETs):** The FT230XQ's CBUS0, CBUS1, CBUS2 and CBUS3 outputs are converted into open-drain signals via x4 2N7002PS MOSFETs, allowing to control four signals of the target board preventing back-powering.
- **Status LEDs:** Four LEDs provide at-a-glance status: green (+3.3 VDC power), red (V_{TARGET}), and two yellow (TXD and RXD activity).

4.3 Power Supply

The Arduino Bughopper is powered through its USB-C connector:

- **USB-C connector (+5 VDC):** The primary and only power input. When connected to a USB host (development machine), the board receives +5 VDC through V_{BUS} . This voltage powers the FT230XQ's VCC pin directly.
- **Internal +3.3 VDC LDO (FT230XQ-R V_{3V3OUT}):** The FT230XQ-R generates +3.3 VDC from the +5 VDC USB supply using its integrated LDO regulator. This regulated output powers the FT230XQ and the level translator's host side.

Power Tip: The Bughopper draws approximately 8 mA during active operation and approximately 125 μ A during USB suspend, making it suitable for always-connected debug setups with minimal power overhead.

Safety Note: Do not attempt to power the Bughopper through any pin other than the USB-C connector.

5 Device Operation

5.1 Getting Started - Arduino App Lab

The Arduino UNO Q is programmed through Arduino App Lab **[1]**, a unified editor that builds and runs projects on the board's dual-processor architectures: a Linux system (Qualcomm Dragonwing™ QRB2210 for the UNO Q) and a microcontroller (STM32U585 for the UNO Q). The Arduino Bughopper complements this workflow by providing an independent serial debug channel through the target board JCTL 2.54 mm connector, accessible from any serial terminal application on your development machine.

To set up the Bughopper with the UNO Q

1. Connect the Bughopper to the target board JCTL 2.54 mm connector.
2. Connect the Bughopper to your development machine using a USB-C data cable.
3. The board will appear as a standard serial COM port on your system thanks to FTDI's Virtual Com Port (VCP) drivers.
4. Open a serial terminal application (such as the Arduino IDE Serial Monitor, PuTTY, or any other terminal emulator) and select the Bughopper's COM port.

Note: The Bughopper provides a serial channel that is **separate** from the target board's main USB-C connection. This means you can monitor debug output through the Bughopper while Arduino App Lab communicates with the target board through its own USB-C or network connection, without any interference between the two channels.

5.2 FTDI Drivers

The Bughopper uses the FTDI FT230XQ, which requires FTDI's VCP (Virtual Com Port) or D2XX drivers to be installed on your development machine. These drivers are [available for Windows, macOS, and Linux](#), and enable the board to appear as a standard serial COM port on your development machine **[3]**. Most modern operating systems include built-in FTDI driver support.

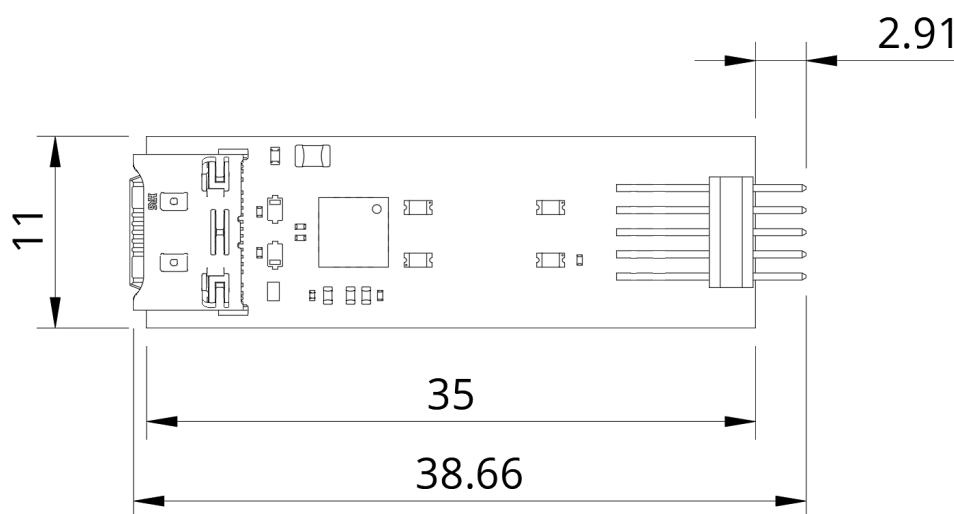

6 Mechanical Information

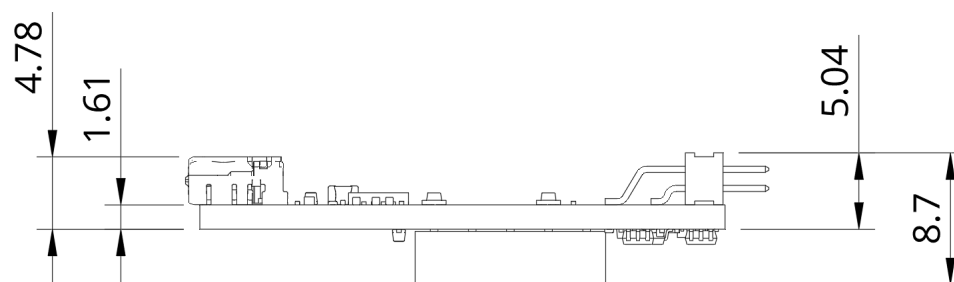
The Arduino Bughopper is a compact, double-sided board with a USB-C connector on one end, a female 2.54 mm 2×5 header (J2) on the opposite end, and a male 1.27 mm 2×5 header (J3) adjacent to it. The PCB body measures 35 mm × 11 mm; the overall board dimension, including the J3 1.27 mm header overhang, is 38.5 mm × 11 mm. The board's narrow form factor is designed for easy integration into workspaces, enclosures, and automated test fixtures.

6.1 Board Dimensions

The Bughopper board outline is shown in the figure below; **all the dimensions are in mm.**



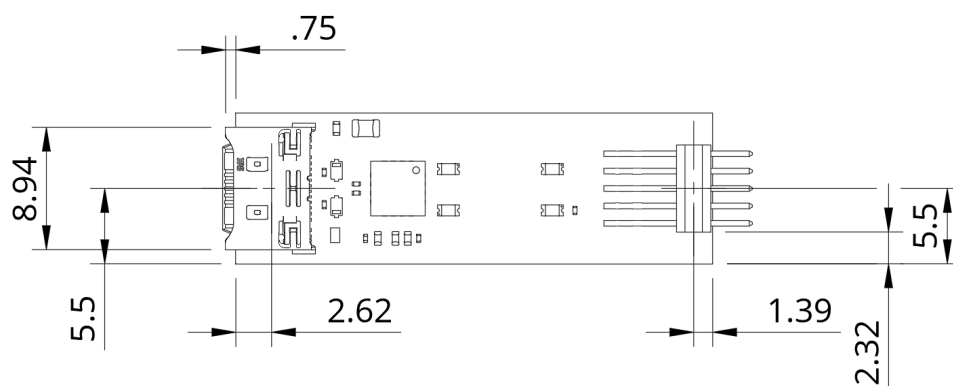
Bughopper board outline dimensions (top view); all dimensions are in mm.



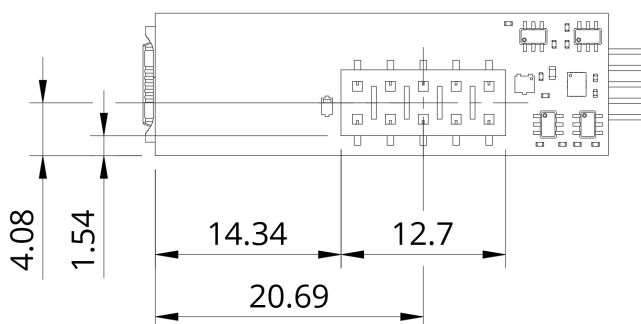
Bughopper board outline dimensions (side view); all dimensions are in mm.

6.2 Board Connectors

The Bughopper features three connectors: a USB-C connector on one end for host communication and power, a female 2.54 mm 2×5 header or direct connection to JCTL header of the target board, and a male 1.27 mm 2×5 header (FTSH-105-01-L-DH-C-TR) for compact ribbon cable connections. The placement of these connectors is shown in the figure below; **all the dimensions are in mm.**



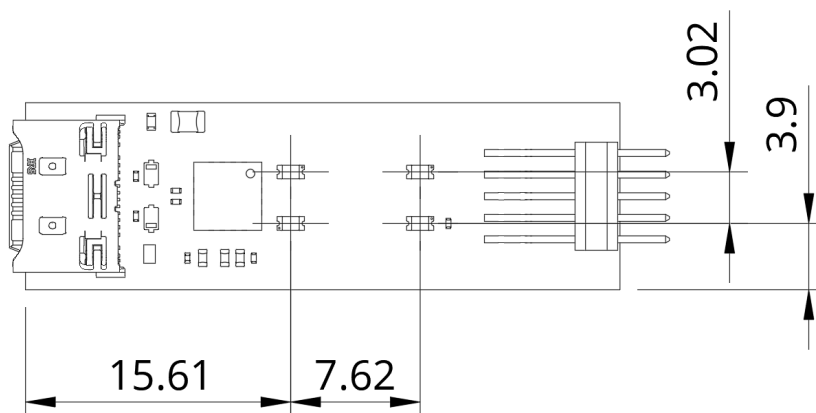
Bughopper board connectors placement (top view); all dimensions are in mm.

6.3 Board Peripherals and Actuators

The Bughopper has four onboard LEDs that provide visual status feedback. A green LED indicates the +3.3 VDC power rail status, a red LED indicates the V_{TARGET} rail status, and two yellow LEDs indicate TXD and RXD serial activity, respectively. The placement of these LEDs is shown in the figure below; **all the dimensions are in mm.**
